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Title of the project Reclaiming the Memory: A memorial scape along Neretva River, Mostar

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TECHNICAL DOSSIER

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Civil war divides cities mentally and physically, threading a group's identity and destroying its symbols. This kind of war dominated the late twentieth century, leaving many cities vulnerable, including Mostar in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Because of the political, religious and cultural division created by the war, cities like Mostar function spatially and socially in an abnormal way. In the case of Mostar, the Neretva River has been used as a frame for a politics of division, providing mental and physical spaces of shame. As a consequence, the core of Mostar's identity, the Neretva River, has become an abandoned area. In order for the city to start functioning socially again, it's necessary to create a common space for history, which will produce common memories for the future generations.

This thesis attempts to give a new insight on how to deal with a landscape where ordinary pleasant memories are replaced with memories of terror (Neretva), responding to the city's need for a new memorial. This new memorial for Mostar does not address sadness but is rather a way to look into the future, making of the river a symbol of hope and redefining the relationships between the divided communities. It is designed as part of the history, acting as a powerful reminder of a free society, and how citizens of Mostar should stand together in the face of the tragedy of war. The memorial-scape tries to become a part of Mostar's culture, based on the powerful connection between humans and nature and humans and water. The idea is not only to create a space that stands as a symbol of memory but also to allow people the opportunity to relax and enjoy a new green space, ancient rocks and their stories, the seasons clearly defined by the water-stands of the river.

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




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In order to allow Neretva to be transformed into a landscape which will contribute to the mitigation of the post-war trauma, it is necessary to carry the analysis along two main axes; the axis of memory and the axis of nature. The number of stories and remnants of the past spread along the river, in combination with this particular landscape of the Neretva river lead to a creation of four cores categories which are related with the stages of a healing process; confrontation, mourning, acceptance, and reattachment.
